Introduction

Today we will be learning to write a Haiku. A Haiku is a form of poetry used in Japan. It has a strict set of rules we will be learning today.

<u>The Rules</u> – copy them down to remember

- There are three lines in a Haiku.
- The first line has five syllables.
- The second line has seven syllables.
- The third line had five syllables.
- Does not have to rhyme (traditionally no rhyming).
- Uses the 5 senses

What are Syllables?

A syllable is a unit of pronunciation having one vowel sound forming a part of the word. It's like a rhythm.

You can count syllables using claps!

E.g. Hello = Hell-o Two claps = Two syllables

Try with your name and the words bellow:

- Happy 2 syllables
- One 1 syllable
- Picture 2 syllables
- Banana 3 syllables

The five senses

- 1. Vision
- 2. Hearing
- 3. Smell
- 4. Taste
- 5. Touch

In a haiku, you should use these senses to describe what you're writing about. Try finding things in the photo using the five senses!



Haiku examples

'Sand scatters the beach Waves crash on the sandy shore Blue waters shimmer'

'Butterfly flying. Honeybees collecting nectar Flowers bloom in spring.'
